**NOTE:** Obviously, there is a problem with the consistency of these polls (+ or – 2.5-3.0%), but also the methodology of each one needs to be clarified, the sample size and geographical distribution, the definitions used for each category, as well as the possibility of sampling errors, etc. The UCR-EM poll in 2006 probably has a sampling error, as there is no other indication that the size of the Protestant population declined between 2003 and 2007. Also, the Borge poll in 1997 appears to have a sampling error that inflated the size of the Protestant population.

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
