Significant Protestant Beginnings:

- 1817 - *British and Foreign Bible Society colporteur work
- 1870 - Methodist Episcopal Church invited to begin work
- 1886 - Methodist Episcopal Church, Foreign Mission Board
- 1888 - *South American Missionary Society (SAMS-Britain)
- 1892 - Seventh Day Adventist, General Conference (1900)
- 1902 - Inland South-American Missionary Union
- 1902 - *New Testament Missionary Fellowship from England
- 1909 - *Christian Missions in Many Lands (Plymouth Brethren)
- 1910 - *The Salvation Army
- 1917 - United Christian Missionary Society (Disciples of Christ)
- 1919 - Argentine Baptist Convention
- 1927 - First Russian Mennonite colonies established
- 1930 - Mennonite Central Committee (settlement of Russian immigrants)
- 1931 - New Testament Missionary Union
- 1935 - Mennonite Brethren Church of America, among Lengua Indians

- 1938 - Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod
- 1938 - European Pentecostals arrived with Norwegian and Swedish immigrants: the Filadelfia Church in Norway and the Swedish Free Mission establish missions.
- 1940 - Full Gospel Grace Fellowship
- 1942 - Free Methodist Church of North America
- 1943 - Nicolás Sabich, a European Pentecostal preacher, ministered in Argentina and Paraguay for about 30 days; Juan Zub Zolotarow, superintendent of the Russian congregations of the Union of the Assemblies of God of Argentina preached in Paraguay and called attention to the need for financial and spiritual support for Russian Pentecostal refugees in Paraguay.
- 1945 - The U.S. Assemblies of God Foreign Mission Board began supporting the Raimundo Stawinski family (Polish-Russian) in Paraguay, building upon the work previously started among European Pentecostal immigrants; missionaries Gustavo Kinderman from Europe and Kermit Jeffrey from Argentina begin to minister among the Slavic congregations in Paraguay.
- 1945 - Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board (now, Southern Baptist International Mission) begin work in Paraguay.

- (2) North American Agencies include U.S. and Canadian.
- (3) The War of The Triple Alliance reduced the population from 1,000,000 to 230,000 and male population by 90% (Thiessen 1970:414).
- (4) The 1967 constitution established religious freedom while still designating the Roman Catholic Church as the official state church (Barrett 1982:557).
